Researchers generate content in many formats: articles, books, datasets, and, increasingly annotations, which span the research lifecycle. With the W3C's approval in February 2017 of annotation as a web standard, creating annotations and having access to your annotation data is simpler than ever before. With annotations now being surfaced in Crossref's Event Data initiative, annotation content offers a new pathway to discovering and exploring content. The commitment to FAIR principles is also key as part of a wider movement towards Open Science.
