The Open Course Ware (OCW) is a large-scale electronic publishing initiative, which started in April 2001, based on the Internet and founded jointly by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) with the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation and the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. Its basic objective is: To provide free, simple and coherent access to course material for teaching staff in the not-for-profit sector, students and self-educators all around the world. The success of this purpose has made it possible to meet a second objective: To create a flexible movement based on an efficient model which other universities can emulate when publishing their own teaching material, creating synergies and spaces for collaboration.

An Open Course Ware (OCW) is a free and open digital publication of high quality University-level educational materials. These materials are organized as courses, and often include course planning materials and evaluation tools as well as thematic content. Open Course Ware (OCW) is free and openly licensed, accessible to anyone, anytime via internet.

The Open Course Ware Consortium is a collaboration of higher educational institutions and associated organizations from around the world, creating a broad and deep body of open educational content using a shared model. The OCW-Consortium is a worldwide community of hundreds of Universities and associated committed to advancing Open Course Ware and this impact on global education. It serve as a resource for starting and sustaining OCW projects, as a coordinating body for the movement on a global scale, and as a forum for exchange ideas and future planning.

Actually, the OCW-UPM site (4) contains 99 courses of different disciplines. One of these subjects is the course titled "Plantas de interés agroalimentario", which was added to the OCW-UPM in 2007 in Spanish language, and will be included in English language "Food plants" in 2010. In this work we expose the actual situation of these courses.
